"CITIZEN'S CHECK LIST"

To be considered on each vote:

- 1. *IS IT NECESSARY?* Or is it something that is not really needed or perhaps already being provided by a private or public group?
- 2. *CAN WE AFFORD IT?* Remember, there is no limit to what we would like, but there is a limit to what we can afford.
- 3. **WHAT WILL IT COST ULTIMATELY?** Many proposals are like icebergs only a small fraction of the total cost is apparent on the surface.
- 4. **HOW WILL IT AFFECT BASIC LIBERTIES?** If it imposes unreasonable or illegal restraints on your life or that of others, it should be vigorously opposed.
- 5. *IS IT IN THE BALANCED BEST INTEREST OF ALL?* If it is designed to benefit a small group of special interests, while taking unfair advantage of others, work for its defeat.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Halifax Finance Committee and the Board of Selectmen held a joint meeting in November to discuss the overall needs of the Town and the proposed FY16 Town Budget. We agreed to try to maintain the same services provided by the town departments considering the current economic climate (which has not changed over the previous few years) and the ability for the town's residents to afford the property tax bills.

Shortly after that meeting, we were advised to expect large increases in both the Special Education Tuition and Transportation budget lines. These are budget lines that neither the School Committee nor the Town has any control over. At that point it was decided that our budget requests to the town departments needed to be amended to reflect contractual obligation changes only.

Once again, the Finance Committee spent a lot of time discussing the sustainability of the Town of Halifax's budget. In the course of these discussions, major concerns arose among members concerning the Silver Lake total assessment for the three towns increasing at 6.3% year over year. Although there is an overall increase for the three towns, Halifax is not seeing an increase in its share of the assessment due to this year's population drop and a decrease in the net minimum contribution. The Finance Committee is concerned about the ability for the towns to afford the following year's assessment without major cuts to the Silver Lake Regional School system. When looking over the Silver Lake Operating budget please note that it is inclusive of \$516,000 in spending out of the Excess and Deficiency account on a list of capital items for the FY16 budget.

The Finance Committee is recommending spending the Prop 2 ½ increase for this year (\$346,750) as well as the estimated new growth of (\$196,000) and the excess capacity (\$207,633.) This total is an increase of \$750,383 and we are estimating an increase of state aid over last year of \$31,612. For a total recommended increase in spending of \$781,995.

For the largest increases to the budget from last year see Article 4 Line 76 Special Needs Tuitions (\$335,664); Line 74 Elementary – Schools Costs (\$123,561); Line 151 Plymouth County Retirement (\$74,285); Line 126 Veterans Benefits (\$60,000); Line 77 Special Needs Transportation (\$57,960). These 5 items add up to \$651,470 in increased spending.

If the town meeting votes the Finance Committee recommendations as printed in this warrant.

The printed budget does not support the Wage and Personal Article 2 across the board wage increase of 1.5%.

We are still facing a large and growing unfunded liability (OPEB) and we are recommending a small contribution \$35,000 to that obligation.

The Finance Committee can only *recommend* a budget; the *actual* 2016 budget will be determined by taxpayer vote at Town Meeting.

Said training may be held on-site, on-line, or off-site and may include topics of specific interest to the department and/or topics of interest across some or all departments. Said training shall not incur overtime expenses.

- 10) Add the following to the Wage and Personnel By-law, Section 35-28.1, Access to the non-union sick bank:
 - 11) Any otherwise qualified employee who has either a) exhausted all sick leave and is using sick leave from the sick bank on June 30th of a fiscal year; or b) was on sick leave on June 30th of a fiscal year and continued to be on sick leave in the following fiscal year until all sick leave was exhausted shall remain eligible for grants of sick leave from the Sick Leave Bank Board in the following fiscal year.

Two notices of such hearing shall be given by the Board of Selectmen, at the expense of the applicant, at least ten (10) days prior thereto by an advertisement in an official publication of, or in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Halifax. A copy of said notice shall be given to the applicant who shall notify, by certified mail, all owners on land directly abutting said location, including those across the street, as appearing in the most recent tax list certified by the Board of Assessors. Proof of notice to the abutters must be provided by the applicant to the Board no later than at the time of the public hearing. If a renewal is granted by the Selectmen, the Board can extent that renewal for an additional 90 days without requiring another public hearing.

The additional compensation herein provided shall be prorated for any twelve (12) month period in which an eligible person does not hold the office of assessor or assistant assessor for twelve consecutive months.

Right to Farm By-Law

Section 1 Legislative Purpose and Intent

The purpose and intent of this By-law is to state with emphasis the Right to Farm accorded to all citizens of the Commonwealth under Article 97, of the Constitution, and all state statutes and regulations there under including but not limited to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40A, Section 3, Paragraph 1; Chapter 90, Section 9, Chapter 111, Section 125A and Chapter 128, Section 1A. We the citizens of Halifax restate and republish these rights pursuant to the Town's authority conferred by Article 89 of the Articles of Amendment of the Massachusetts Constitution, ("Home Rule Amendment").

This General By-law encourages the pursuit of agriculture, promotes agriculture-based economic opportunities, and protects farmland within the Town of Halifax by allowing agricultural uses and related activities to function with minimal conflict with abutters and Town agencies. This By-law shall apply to all jurisdictional areas within Town.

Section 2 Definitions

The word "farm" shall include any parcel or contiguous parcels of land, or water bodies used for the primary purpose of commercial or non commercial agricultural, or accessory thereto.

The words "farming" or "agriculture" or their derivatives shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- Farming in all its branches and the cultivation and tillage of the soil; dairying;
- Production, cultivation, growing, and harvesting of any agricultural, aquacultural, floricultural, viticultural, or horticultural commodities;
- Growing and harvesting of forest products upon forest land, arid any other forest or lumbering operations;
- Raising of livestock including horses;
- Keeping of horses as a commercial enterprise or for personal non commercial use; and keeping and raising of poultry, swine, cattle, ratties (such as emus, ostriches and rheas) and camelids (such as llamas and camels), and other domesticated animals for food and other agricultural purposes, including bees and fur-bearing animals.
- "Farming" shall encompass activities including, but not limited to, the following:
- Operation and transportation of slow-moving farm equipment over roads within the Town;
- Control of pests, including, but not limited to, insects, weeds, predators and disease organisms of plant and animals;
- Application of manure, fertilizers and pesticides;
- Conducting agriculture-related educational and farm-based recreational activities, including agritourism provided that the activities are related to marketing the agricultural output or services of the farm;
- Processing and packaging of the agricultural output of the farm and the operation of a farmer's market or farm stand including signage thereto;
- Maintenance, repair, or storage of seasonal equipment, or apparatus owned or leased by the farm owner or manager used expressly for the purpose of propagation, processing, management, or sale of the agricultural products; and
- On-farm relocation of earth and the clearing of ground for farming operations.

Section 3 Right To Farm Declaration

The Right to Farm is hereby recognized to exist within the Town of Halifax. The above described agricultural activities may occur on holidays, weekdays, and weekends by night or day and shall include the attendant incidental noise, odors, dust, and fumes associated with normally accepted

agricultural practices. It is hereby determined that whatever impact may be caused to others through the normal practice of agriculture is more than offset by the benefits of farming to the neighborhood, community, and society in general. The benefits and protections of this By-law are intended to apply exclusively to those commercial agricultural and farming operations and activities conducted in accordance with generally accepted agricultural practices. Moreover, nothing in this Right to Farm By-law shall be deemed as acquiring any interest in land, or as imposing any land use regulation, which is properly the subject of state statute, regulation, or local zoning law.

Section 4 Disclosure Notification

Within thirty (30) days after this By-law becomes effective, the Select Board shall prominently post in the Town Hall and make available for distribution the following disclosure:

"It is the policy of this community to conserve, protect and encourage the maintenance and improvement of agricultural land for the production of food, and other agricultural products, and also for its natural and ecological value. This disclosure notification is to inform buyers and occupants that the property they are about to acquire or occupy lies within a town where farming activities occur. Such farming activities may include, but are not limited to, activities that cause noise, dust and odors. Buyers and occupants are also informed that the location of property within the Town may be impacted by commercial agricultural operations including the ability to access water services for such property under certain circumstances."

In addition to the above, copies of this disclosure notification shall be available in a public area at the Town Hall.

Section 5 Resolution of Disputes

Any person who seeks to complain about the operation of a farm may, notwithstanding pursuing any other available remedy, file a grievance with the Select Board, the Zoning Enforcement Officer, or the Board of Health, depending upon the nature of the grievance. The filing of the grievance does not suspend the time within which to pursue any other available remedies that the aggrieved may have. The Zoning Enforcement Officer or Select Board shall forward a copy of the grievance to the Agricultural Commission or its agent,

which shall review and facilitate the resolution of the grievance, and report its recommendations to the referring Town authority within an agreed upon time frame.

The Board of Health, except in cases of imminent danger or public health risk, shall forward a copy of the grievance to the Agricultural Commission or its agent, which shall review and facilitate the resolution of the grievance, and report its recommendations to the Board of Health within an agreed upon time frame.

Section 6 Severability Clause

If any part of this By-law is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this By-law. The Town of Halifax hereby declares the provisions of this By-law to be severable.

Such activities include, but are not limited to the following: shall serve as facilitators for encouraging the pursuit of agriculture in Halifax; shall promote agricultural-based economic opportunities in Town; shall act as advocates, educators, and/or negotiators on farming issues; shall work for preservation of prime agricultural lands; and shall pursue all initiatives appropriate to creating a sustainable agricultural community.

The Commission will consist of seven members from the active farming community of Halifax, appointed by the Board of Selectmen: three members for a term of three years; two members for a term of two years, and three thereafter; and two members for a one-year term, and three years thereafter. Up to five alternates may also be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, each for one- year terms, and/or any other action relative thereto.

Guiding Principles for Commission Appointment: Member should: represent Town geographically, represent the

diversity and scale of agricultural businesses, represent the diversity of the Town's population, encourage next generation farmers. The overall intent is to be inclusive not exclusive.

Mission: Promote agricultural-based economic opportunities; preserve, revitalize, and sustain the Halifax agricultural industry, and encourage the pursuit of agriculture as a career opportunity and lifestyle.
